
If your child has taken up an instrument we can't unfortunately let them take the instrument home unless we have the deposit. This is due to the number of instruments that go missing or get broken.

Music Facts:

- Students who practice with musical instruments can improve their hand-eye coordination. Just like playing sports, children can develop motor skills when playing music.
- Learning to play pieces of music on a new instrument can be a challenging, but achievable goal and it gives a student a sense of achievement.
- It can also provide a creative outlet in contrast to daily academic study, giving your child the opportunity to exercise a different part of their brain. Playing music affects your child's cognitive, mental, and emotional abilities – the brain is stimulated to work differently which helps with creativity.
- Music education is also important because it gives students a way
 to connect with other people. Children are naturally very social,
 and it's important to encourage them to build relationships by
 providing them experiences to share with each other.
